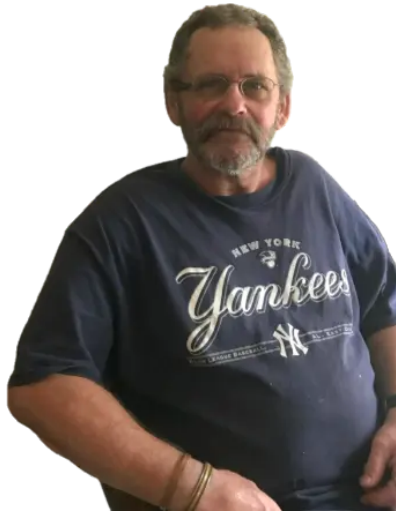

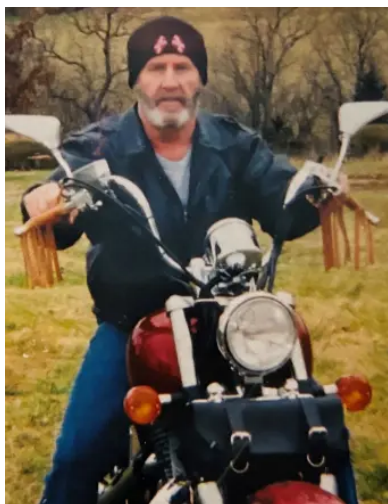

She was preceded in death by her parents, Charley and Grace (Standlee) Downs, and husband Robert Fenix.

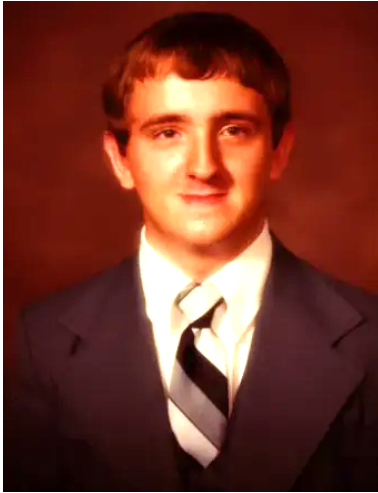

poor, helping start the Green Forest food pantry to assist those in need.

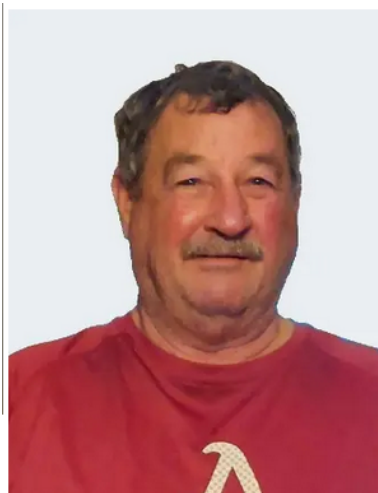
